Kenya Education Fund/Femme Forces Nonprofit Organization

The Kenya Education Fund (KEF) was founded by former Peace Corps Volunteer, **Bradley Broder** in 2006. KEF is an international nonprofit organization that provides academic scholarships, as well as life-skills and career mentoring workshops, to bright Kenyan students in both Primary and Secondary school who cannot afford to fund their education.

Arthur and Lyn Dobrin (Kenya '65-'67), and Brad (Kenya '99-'01) have been working closely with two New Hyde Park students who are setting up this new program. Their plan is to start by doing something internationally, thus the Kenya Education Fund and also something locally perhaps applying sanitary napkins to a women's shelter. They are hoping that RPCVs will help support their efforts.

"COVID-19 has presented many barriers in regards to accessibility for Kenyan students who are now subjected to repeat the 2020 School Year as a result of the virus. For many young women that indicates a severed connection to a proper hygienic well being. In this project we are striving to fundraise enough money for a year's (or more) worth of supply in sanitary products and feminine self-care. \$1 will provide a 1 months supply, \$3 will provide 3 months of supply, and of course \$12 will be a whole year! This way, we can help these bright young women reallocate their energy into self growth and not the lack of self-care. Update on Hope Children's Home in Meru, Kenya

The Jerusha Mwararia Hope Children's Home in Meru, Kenya is struggling with the same virus concerns faced by Long Islanders. The nearly 100 children and staff at the Home are trying to follow the same protocols that we are encouraged to use. Joseph Kirima Rwito, the founder of the Home, died early this year and left a void in leadership that has been filled by Joe's widow Veronica, and Betty Gakii, a young woman who grew up at the Home and returned to assist Joseph after she graduated from College. Kelvin Koome, another alumni of the Home (He was one of the original 18 orphans taken off the streets when we opened in 2005) now works as a Physician's Assistant. He came back to the Home last month, to give a talk on the need to follow the anti-virus protocols. Our kids now wash their hands several times a day, wear masks, and put up cloth dividers between beds in the dormitory. Outside visitors are strictly prohibited. The Home is located on a hill two miles from Meru town. Meru County has identified a relatively small number of people who have so far tested positive for the virus. The children spend their time studying, playing games, doing chores, and helping out at the farm. They look forward to returning to school. HCF is tentatively planning to hold its 15th Annual Bi-Continental Walk/Run at the Port Jefferson Greenway on October 18th. We will be having our "Passion for Education" Gala fundraiser at the East Wind Inn and Spa in Wading River on January 9, 2021. We are scrambling to cover the increased expenses related to the virus.

Member Profile

(Since we are not currently reporting on activities, I thought it would be interesting to highlight a member each issue. Our first profile is Arthur Dobrin, our co-leader. If you would like to be profiled in the next issue or would like to profile another of our members, please let me know!)

From Lyn Dobrin:

"Linda Merola asked me to write something about Arthur Dobrin retiring from teaching at Hofstra and his many accomplishments such as writing and advocacy. She asked me because I write about stuff and since Arthur is my favorite stuff, she thought I could do a good job. The fact that he is my husband of 57 years she thinks is irrelevant. She instructed me not to be too modest on his behalf. As a PR person, modesty is not my middle name. I also thought, "Ooooh, maybe we can sell some books.

Then I had to inform her that contrary to the most recent message, Arthur is scheduled to teach another class next semester. A professor is taking a sabbatical and they offered one of his classes to Arthur. Yipee! That gets him out of the house a few days a week, or at least zooming on his computer.

Her spin on that was just say how they can't do without him due to popular demand. I think Linda could have a new career in PR.

So here goes:

Arthur is a person who is never bored. He always has an idea for a book or a project. Right after our marriage we went to Kenya where he worked in the Office of Cooperative Development. He translated the cooperative by-laws into Swahili. Seeing the level of corruption in the coops he anonymously wrote an expose that was published in the East African Journal and subsequently was invited to present a paper at an international conference on economic development held in Nairobi. The fact that nobody in the Peace Corps Office or Cooperative Development Office connected the dots is a miracle.

Returning home he became the leader of the Ethical Humanist Society of Long Island—basically a humanist clergyman and continued as a community activist, ultimately getting a Masters in Human Relations from NYU, a certificate in family therapy from The Ackerman Family Institute and a Doctorate in Social Welfare from Adelphi University.

He has implemented many projects that include the LI Alliance for a Common Future, Amnesty International USA Group 74 and Police and Communities Talk.

He also began teaching at Hofstra where he has taught 20 different courses over the decades. My favorite was "The Mind of the Fanatic."

Meanwhile writing continued to be his passion, producing 28 books. Several of his books have been translated into Chinese. As yet none becoming a best seller. My mother kept telling him to write a sex novel,

Arthur blogs for Psychology Today under the title "Am I Right?" He used to write poetry and five of his published books are poetry. His three plays—none publishedare not very good.

Don't be lazy—search out his name and you'll find lots of info on him. If you type his name into the Barnes & Noble site you'll find most of his books. His newest book "Where We Started," a fictional accounting of race relations in the United States covering the years 1740 to 1864 has just been published.

Arthur is also available to meet with your book club. Wouldn't it be nice to have the author there explaining what he was thinking when he wrote what he wrote.

Arthur is a loving husband, father and grandfather."

(Arthur was also highlighted in a recent Newsday article entitled "A New Stage in Life Inspires These Authors).



Also, Arthur is leading a discussion of his novel, <u>Kwamboka's Inquiry</u>. The book is set in Kenya.

A comment from a reader: "When I read Kwamboka's Inquiry, what struck me most was the accuracy of the lives of the people in rural Kenya. I write this having lived in such a setting myself. The idyllic life, with all its struggles and the hope of a better tomorrow is well expressed in this book. This precise crisscrossing of the country as he takes us into the lives of his characters is superb."

ADVOCACY NEWS:

Bette Williams Bass (Ethiopia '66-'69) is our Advocacy Coordinator

- 1. The Fiscal Year 2021 budget out of the House (H.R. 224-189) includes flat funding of \$410.5 million for the Peace Corps. This is encouraging, since there are no programs active at this time. Part of the Peace Corps portion of the bill includes the proviso that the Peace Corps will beginredeployment when it is safe to do so. It is a requirement that when PC closes out a country program, the House must be formally informed. This was not done when China was closed. The House bill includes language that none of the Peace Corps funds being allocated to PC can be used to close out China until this is done.
- 2. Regarding the Menstrual Equity in the Peace Corps Bill: the House will ask the Peace Corps Director to determine how to make menstrual products affordable and accessible to Volunteers, either by a stipend or directly providing supplies, depending on the program.
- 3. Virtual District Meetings with Congressional Representatives. We are hoping to set up some meetings this fall. Please see the next article.

CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT MEETINGS:

Bette will be trying to set up virtual District meetings with Long Island Representatives, and if there's interest, with our Senators. These meetings will probably not be with the Representatives themselves, but with their Foreign Affairs staff (meetings with staff are just as productive). For those seats up for election,

we're hoping to set up a meeting with the candidates to express both our interest in and to see their views on the Peace Corps.

The NPCA Advocacy Director, Jonathan Pearson (Micronesia '87-'89) will be sending some talking points to help with the discussion. They will include funding, as well as evacuation and redeployment issues.

Hopefully NPCA can help with setting up a ZOOM account for these meetings.
